FROM THE PAST BOARD CHAIR

For the past two years I have reflected on my faith in the Memo. What follows is my summary of some of those articles.

SEPTEMBER 2014: As a boy I had questions. What is God? What are we here for? Who cares? Is this all there is? What do I believe? As an adult I have concluded God is our highest, best thought, we are here to love each other wastefully without counting the cost, never forgetting that before we can love others we must first love ourselves. In this we follow the example of Jesus.

JANUARY 2015: Mother Teresa's prayer, abbreviated: People are often unreasonable, irrational, and self-centered. Forgive them anyway. What you spend years creating, others could

destroy overnight. Create anyway. If you find serenity and happiness, some may be jealous. Be happy anyway. Give the best you have, and it will never be enough. Give your best anyway. In the final analysis, it is between you and God. It was never between you and them anyway.

MARCH 2015: Dow Marmur, Rabbi Emeritus at Holy Blossom Temple: "Dr. Atul Gawande, the author of Being Mortal, observes 'The only way death is not meaningless is to see yourself as part of something greater.' That's what religion does for many of us. Worship and observance of rituals aren't acts of desperation and evidence of fear of death, but intimations of transcendence, of having a sense of the rhythm of God's creation and our place in it."

JUNE 2015: Over the years we have lost people who were instrumental in ensuring that St. Mark's United Church was present to serve God by serving us, the community around us and the world at large. We can never repay them because they are no longer with us. But we can pay it forward. We can dedicate ourselves to ensuring that St. Mark's will continue to be a progressive, inclusive and life affirming presence in Scarborough for the next generation and the one after that.

SEPTEMBER 2015: The "pre-Easter" Jesus, the theologian Marcus Borg said, was a Jewish peasant who lived 2000 years ago whose message was about the nature of God: God loves you; love your enemies: be compassionate as God is

compassionate; God's realm is open to all, no exclusions! Religious life is about a deepening relationship with God, not about a life of requirements and reward. The "Post-Easter" Jesus is the Spirit that energized Jesus' followers after his death; persuaded them that he was still alive and with them; and led many to conclude that he was God.

CONCLUSION: The people of St. Mark's have, for many years, striven to do whatever we can, wherever we are, whenever we can, for as long as we can, with whatever we have, to follow Jesus and to try to make a difference in people's lives. St. Mark's cares. God cares. God bless us, every one, as we strive to serve God in the 21st century!



On the left is a summary showing our latest financial position. We are still forecasting a budget deficit of approximately \$6,000 for 2016.

I would like to take this opportunity to update everyone the results of our 2016 Stewardship Campaign. Our Gifts Cards (gifts of our skills and time) lunch was very successful. We had fabulous participation and now have a great list of people to help us continue the stewardship work of our church. On the financial side of stewardship, we were unfortunately not as successful. You will remember our letter that came with your tax receipts asking for an increase per family of \$50 per year (or \$4.20/month) in order to eliminate our forecasted deficit. To date, we have only had less than 5 families respond to this request. I respectfully ask you to once again consider this request and the possibility of eliminating our deficit.

St. Marks is a great place. I'm proud to be a part of this family and the work we do as a whole for our local community. I thank you very much for both your financial and volunteer contributions.
