SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE



The chart below provides a look at this year's offerings (green) compared to last year's (blue). The members of SM have been wonderful at ensuring their donations are received whether by signing up for PAR or by dropping their envelope in the church's mailbox (now located at the front of the church – thanks property team).

The church is missing the revenue from our building users and from fundraisers such as the Spring Dance and Lawn Sale which together raised \$7,000 in 2019.

The Board and Ministry Teams have been very careful with the expenses this year and have managed to reduce costs while still maintaining staffing, caring for the property/ building and ensuring the work of SM continues -- reaching out to members and the community.

"If gratitude is good, why is it so hard to do?,

St. Mark's Fall Book Study of Diana Butler Bass' book, **Grateful: The Subversive Power of Giving Thanks** started on Friday, September 18th and continues on alternate Fridays every two weeks thereafter: October 2nd, October 16th, October 30th, November 13th, and November 27th.

Although most of us know that gratitude is good — and good for us — there is a gap between our desire to be grateful and our ability to behave gratefully. In Grateful, Bass weaves together social science research, spiritual wisdom, and contemporary issues as she calls for a richer understanding and practice of gratitude. What emerges are

surprising insights about the power of thankful living to change how we treat one another, and how we might transform our world.

Because of the pandemic, we are conducting our Book Study sessions on Zoom using the same link that St. Mark's uses for our Sunday services. The meetings themselves start promptly at 7:30 pm and finish no later than 9:00 pm although some people stick around and chat for a few minutes after the formal conclusion of the meeting.

Each session will have one or two facilitators who summarize the material for that day's session and talk to it for about 20 minutes.

Then we have break-out sessions for small group discussions which are handled in sub-groups within the Zoom meeting thanks to modern computer science and Charlie Wardell! At the conclusion of the small group discussions, we reassemble into one large group and listen to each of the smaller groups present their views.

WITHIN REACH OUTREACH






