"Outreach has been very busy during the Dog Days of Summer."

We have been alive and well, reaching out to the ever increasing needs of our community.

A large shopping for the Christ Church Food Bank was delivered at the end of May and again in June. Each time, we chose the basics of a single day's meal requirements. We delivered large jars of peanut butter (2kg), or cereal, bananas, kidney beans, Kraft Dinner, bread, eggs and toilet tissue (not part of the daily diet but soooo necessary!!!). Each time we spent \$~1200.00 for what cost us \$1000.00 a year ago. Having said that, the demands at the Food Bank are ever increasing and our efforts are much appreciated. Because of the ever increasing need and the fact that we had many team members on holidays, we opted to donate \$1000.00 directly to the Christ Church Food Bank during the month of August. They were overwhelmed and most grateful for our generosity.

We opted to donate \$250.00 twice during the summer months. This money was used to provide lunches for the clients who visit 202 Markham Road for their noon day meal.

At the end of June, we received a cheque for \$550.00 from Scarboro Golf and Country Club. This was a benevolent donation made by the club. This money was a welcome addition to the Outreach coffers.

This year we opted to initiate a CAN A DAY initiative for the month of July. The congregation was invited to collect a CAN A DAY for each of the 31 days in July. It was indeed well received by the congregation and Christ Church reaped those rewards. Christ Church continues to be amazed by the support that they receive from St Marks'.


During a pasta sale at one of the food stores, Outreach purchased 23 packages of spaghetti and 12 packages of macaroni. Outreach used gift cards purchased during our St Marks' gift card fund raiser. This is a WIN/ WIN. As that fund raiser comes available, consider purchasing food store gift cards. The card help you as you do your personal shopping but also help St Marks' with another fund raising endeavour.

Forty back packs were purchased, stuffed and delivered to 3 area schools, Eastview, Galloway Road and G.B. Little. Pencils, pens, markers, crayons, calculators, rulers, erasers, etc. etc. were a part of each pack, where age appropriate. We appealed to the congregation for financial support for this endeavour and were supported. However, the costs were much greater than in previous years. We are very happy to have helped each of the schools again this year.

Outreach thanks the congregation for their generosity and their support.

We now have an NRSVue Holy Bible with Apocrypha in the library. It has comfort print for easy reading and will lay flat. "With revisions based on new textual evidence, historical insights, and linguistic precision, this updated edition delivers a

translation of Scripture based on meticulous care for accuracy and readability. The Apocrypha is placed between Old and New Testaments, a nearly four hundred year old tradition originating with the 1534 German Luther Bible. This

practice separated the Apocrypha from the 66 book canon while allowing readers to benefit from its spiritual wisdom, exemplary piety, and historical insight."

PROPERTY COMMITTEE MUSINGS

Have you been to the church recently? Due to COVID, some have not been to the church for some time. The church is still there and the building and property still need ongoing TLC (tender loving care). The Property Committee has been maintaining the building and property, making needed repairs and providing TLC. A few examples are offered for your update.

Did you see the storage shed (which houses the ride-on lawn mower, BBQ and various gardening tools) with it's roof wrapped in a blue tarp since last winter because shingles had been blown off in the wind? Well the tarp is gone and thanks to a working group comprised of Bart, Brian, Larry and me the shed roof has been reshingled and new boards painted. It looks great.

The fence around a playground area at the back of the church has been partially taken down. The area is now more open and the grass can be cut with the ride on mower.

The walkway from the parking lot to the back door of the church has had polymeric sand added to the joints and the railing on one side has had the posts reinforced with concrete to make the railing much more stable.

A large pot hole at the bottom end of the driveway has been repaired. And a piece of the ceiling in the overhang over the driveway at the front door of the church, that fell out, has been repaired.

Other maintenance projects include repairs to the counter top and faucet at one of the sinks in the kitchen, BBQ maintenance, CCTV repairs, parking lot lights repairs, rodent control.... you get the picture.

The lawns and labyrinth look great thanks to Karen, Brian and Peter.

The ongoing maintenance of the church and property is made possible by the Property Committee members volunteering their time plus, as always, Bart and Brian happily assisting whenever a helping hand is needed. We even have a friendly electrician (Bob Copeland) who generously donates his time to help us with complicated electrical issues. Bob has been instrumental in helping us solve our building heating problems, which started last winter after a huge snowstorm in January. Following the storm, we had water pipe ruptures resulting in a flood in the basement, icicles dangling from the roof and ice dams on the roof, with leaks in various rooms inside the church. Hopefully our heating system solutions will help to avoid problems like this in future.

Upcoming projects include renovating the washrooms and making at least one washroom wheelchair accessible, repairing the ceiling lights in the downstairs rooms (we are considering switching to LED lights to cut down our electricity consumption), replacing ceiling tiles stained by the leaks we encountered last winter, and anything else that arises or is needed.

Maintenance of the church and property is an ongoing labour of love. If you would like to offer some of your love to your church by helping the Property Committee with their ongoing tasks and projects, please let us know by contacting us through the church office. Working on a church building or property project can be a fun social event. Your talents will be appreciated by the Property Committee and your love will be appreciated by your church.

ST. MARK'S FA BOOK STUDY RESUMES OCTOBER 21ST!

The St. Mark's Book Study group typically meets every year in the Winter/Spring and again in the Fall for 4 to 8 bi-weekly sessions to study books or video series that relate in some way to our faith journey. We share responsibility for organizing and presenting our material.

Pre-Covid we would enjoy camaraderie and good eats prepared by members. Post-Covid we still enjoy the camaraderie, but via Zoom, and forgo the eats! May 6th, 2022 was the group's last meeting for our 2022 Winter/Spring session. The only things on our agenda were to chat about the Book Study generally and to consider what we should do next. Our discussions centred around Shirley Criscione's suggestion for the next Book Study session, Michael Coren's 2021 book, "The Rebel Christ".

Indigo.ca says the following about the book:

The real Jesus was
a REBEL,
a RADICAL, and a
REVOLUTIONARY.

Christianity is in crisis, and its founder is often misunderstood and misinterpreted. This book presents the real Jesus: a rebel, a radical, and a revolutionary.

What did Jesus - the original Jesus - say about the pressing issues of his and our day? He didn't mention homosexuality but did call for the poor and marginalized to be protected and championed; he never spoke of abortion but did criticize the wealthy and complacent; he didn't side with the rulers and wealthy but did condemn those who judged and exploited others and turned their eyes away from those in need and from the cry for justice. This was Jesus the rebel, Christ the radical, who turned the world upside down and demanded that his followers do the same. Too many of those followers, tragically, seem to have misplaced that vital lesson.

Coren had been a conservative, Roman Catholic, talk show host but changed his views. The following was extracted from a 2016 article about Coren on the CBC radio program "Tapestry":

A change of heart - then a change of mind. That's how Michael Coren describes what happened to him not so long ago.

The broadcaster and commentator has written bestselling books defending some of the more conservative teachings of the Catholic church. So it came as a great surprise to many when he recently converted to the Anglican Church, the Anglican Communion. The primary reason was his evolving views on same-sex marriage. Once vocally opposed to it, Michael came to fully support what he refers to as "equal marriage".

Coren's change of heart was a matter of faith and experience.

"What I know best now is that where there is love there is God, and the more I saw of the gay community the more I saw that love."

But his personal transformation came at a cost, both emotional and financial.

"I soon found out that there is none so angry as a fundamentalist scorned. My critics were cruel and abusive beyond even my worst imaginings."

Coren was subject to vicious attacks about his character and his family, and he says changing his mind cost him more than half his income. But in the end, he says that doesn't matter:

"A found soul is so much more important than a lost pay cheque."

Shirley, in suggesting the book, said: "There are 4 chapters, an intro and an afterword. I have read little bits to get an idea, not much though. Easy reading and very approachable. He discusses his "epiphany" and thus the loss of his TV show and newspaper column and his speaking engagements in the intro. "This book is about pure Jesus rather than pure politics" p9 "I should also emphasize that this book isn't about trying to convert people to the Christian faith, but rather to explain what that faith genuinely has to say about vital issues to anybody who has an interest, whatever their religion or lack of one." p9"

This book was a popular choice amongst the 10 people who attended our May 6th Book Study session as well as several others who phoned in their views before we met on Friday evening. As a result, we decided to go with Coren's book, "The Rebel Christ".

Our first session will be on October 21st to avoid a conflict with Melinda Calway's art show at St. Mark's on October 14th. The dates are:

OCT. 21 - Intro & Chapter 1,

OCT. 28 - Chapter 2,

NOV. 11 - Chapter 3,

NOV. 25 - Chapter 4,

DEC. 9 - Last Word and Christmas get together

I (Rob Peck) placed a bulk order of "The Rebel Christ" for 12 paperback books through Indigo.ca. The cost is \$21.00 per book, GST included, but subsidies are available through Christian Ed. 11 of these books have been distributed to members of our group. I still have one left but can easily get more. If you want a book, please let me know and I can arrange to get it to you. That way you will have lots of time to read it before we start on October 21st!


