


BIBLE STUDY



CURRENT FINANCIAL POSITION OF SM OPERATING FUND



ST. MARK'S FALL 2021 BOOK STUDY TAKES FLIGHT!

Every year (sometimes twice a year!) St. Mark's Book Study Group looks at a book that increases our understanding of our faith. On September 10th, 2021, 16 people kicked off our latest project, a study of Nancy Abrams' book, "A God That Could Be Real".

Exploring a radically new way of thinking about God, Abrams dismantles some ancient and common assumptions about God and shows a God that can comfort and empower us.

INTERESTED?

There are 8 dates, two weeks apart: September 10 and 24; October 8 and 22; November 5 and 19 and December 3 and 17. All sessions will be on Zoom using the same link we use for St. Mark's Sunday services. The first 7 dates will be actual study sessions, an hour long, starting at 7:30 pm and finishing at 8:30 pm, all on Fridays. The last date, December 17, will be our Party where we just have fun and pick our book for the next session.

I facilitated the first session on September 10 where we looked at the book's two Forewords and Abrams' Introduction. In her introduction Abrams says:

"My discoveries are for anyone sick of the battle between religion and science. This book is a journey into those aspects of the new scientific universe that touch our core as human beings. Because in that connection between our new understanding of the universe and ourselves lies the key to a God that could be real.

"If we rethink God in light of this new knowledge, it may help us to find the wisdom and bravery to face our future together. What I have learned is this:

Having no spiritual life at all is like never really falling in love.

2 Developing a spiritual bond with a fantasy is like falling in

love with someone who will never love you back.

But developing a spiritual bond with the real universe is like falling in love with someone who is already in love with you. That is where God is!"

Melinda Calway will lead the next session on September 24.

If you missed the first session, no problem! We have summaries of the material covered at each session. Books are available from Rob Peck or from any good book store. You can also purchase Kindle or Audible versions. The books cost \$25.20, including tax, from Amazon.ca. St. Mark's Christian Education (CE) team has graciously agreed to subsidize \$5.20 of the cost bringing the cost of the book down to \$20.00 for each of us. Additional subsidies are available if needed.

The idea of installing an elevator at St. Mark's has been percolating for many years and now we are on the verge of seeing those dreams come to fruition. Back in 2016 and most likely even before, the issue of accessibility within our church building was being investigated and the Property Team at the time led by Gord Maunder included details about a potential elevator in a report that was submitted to the Board. As in every older building, the advantages of upgrades had to be balanced against the urgent needs of the aging structure so other projects took priority.

As we moved ahead into 2019 an awareness took place that accessibility was becoming more and more necessary and installation of an elevator would speak directly to our mission statement to be Inclusive and Life-Affirming.

This was a big ask for the congregation, with a total cost exceeding \$100,000 and yet the overwhelming majority voted in favour of moving forward at our Feb.2, 2020 Annual Congregational meeting.

So here we are. Plans are in place, fundraising is ongoing and off to a flying start and the necessary funds have been accessed through loans

to begin the construction process. Hopefully by the time you are reading this article, the work will have begun on the project.

Some day, we will look back on this time when we struggled through the pandemic, where isolation and anxiety troubled our lives. I believe we will see a period where the congregation of St. Mark's stepped forward in so many ways to remain connected and stay true to our mission statement. It is a time when we all came together and out of that care and concern for others, emerged a project of which we should all be proud.
